## Thesis copyright permissions – Email template

You can copy and paste the email template below to email to send to copyright owners. You may need to adapt the wording for your specific needs, just ensure it is clear that you are seeking permission for a thesis which is being publicly shared online. For images originating from a website, you will need to contact the website owner. You can also use this as a template for emailing publishers for content from books and journal articles that are not available via RightsLink.

If permission is **granted**, you do not have to supply the University with copies of your emails but you should retain them for your own records. You should also include a caption underneath the image that says "Reproduced with permission" after your in-text citation, or include other wording if the copyright owner specifies a particular form of acknowledgement. If your request for permission is **denied**, you will need to make a separate copy of your thesis for the library (see: Preparing your files) and remove this image from it. It's a good idea to put in a statement like "Image removed due to copyright restriction. Original can be viewed online at https://flic.kr/p/9FmXnE"

## Subject line: Seeking copyright permission for thesis
